Course overview

Course Duration

Full-time load: 3 years Part-time: Up to 10 years

Study Modes

Face-to-face, Online*, Blended *Some subjects must be completed face-to-face to meet professional accreditation requirements

Intakes

Semester 1, Semester 2, Summer School

Course Structure

The full time course structure is based on six semesters (each of 13 weeks duration), with four subjects taught in each semester. It comprises:

- 15 compulsory core subjects (150 credit points)
- 7 subjects from the specialisation area/ major (70 credit points)
- 2 elective subjects (20 credit points)

To qualify for award of the degree of Bachelor of Applied Social Science a candidate shall complete at least 240 credit points, including satisfactory completion of the core subjects and satisfactory completion of the rules noted below:

• Minimum of 6 subjects (60 credit points) at 300 level

Area of Specialisation

The following areas are offered in the Bachelor of Applied Social Science. You are to select one and complete the necessary requirements:

- Counselling
- Chaplaincy and Pastoral Care
- Social Science
- Cross Cultural
- Youth Work

What you need to know

Elective Subjects

If you are completing the Counselling Specialisation, your elective subjects must be subjects from the Bachelor of Applied Social Science award.

Before enrolling into an elective subject, ensure you have met the pre-requisite for that unit.

Pre-requisites

A pre-requisite is a unit that must be successfully completed before attempting another unit. For example, in order to attempt SSC214, you must complete SSC112. Students must have completed the pre-requisite to enrol in the subject.

Course Levels

100, 200 or 300 level is indicated in the course code e.g., THE201 is a 200-level theology unit, whereas LEA301 is a 300-level leadership unit. The units increase in difficulty and build upon content and concepts that have come before.

Placement

Your placement comprises of two units:

- SSC219 Professional Accountability
- SSC300 Professional Practice (100 hour Placement)

SSC219 is a weekly supervision class that runs alongside SSC300. These two units **must be taken at the same time.** They are typically completed in the final semester of your degree. <u>See more information about placements here</u>. Students following the counselling specialisation must complete SSC220 Professional Considerations, SSC336 Cognitive Behavioural Theories and Therapies, and a counselling modality unit before undertaking placement.

Cross Credits and RPL

If you have completed previous studies/work experience in the same or related areas, you may be eligible to receive credit towards one of the units in your program. There are two main types of credit.

A **cross credit** is awarded for similar study completed elsewhere or as part of a different degree. Cross credits can be granted as:

- A like for like credit for one of the units in the degree.
- An unspecified cross credit full credit for a certain amount of credit points, but not correlating specifically to any particular unit. Unspecified credits usually function as one of your electives.
- An exemption without credit i.e. you won't need to complete a particular unit, but will need to complete another elective in its place.

Recognition of prior learning (RPL) is credit granted in light of professional experience.

Requests for credit are made via the <u>Student Gateway</u>. You will need to provide adequate evidence of meeting learning outcomes for the requested units e.g., transcripts, unit outlines or a detailed resume.
