Course overview

Course Duration

Full-time load: 2 years Part-time: Up to 4 years

Study Modes

Face-to-face, Online*, Blended
*Some subjects must be completed face-to-face to meet
professional accreditation requirements

Semester 1, Semester 2, Summer School

Course Structure

The full time course structure is based on four semesters (each of 13 weeks duration), with four subjects taught in each semester. It comprises:

- 12 compulsory core subjects (120 credit points)
- 3 elective subjects (30 credit points of SSC units).*
- 1 Capstone project (10 credit points)

To qualify for award of the degree of Master of Counselling a candidate shall complete at least 160 credit points, including satisfactory completion of the core and elective subjects.

*One of these must be a counselling modality such as:

- SSC531 Solution Focused Therapy and Positive Psychology
- SSC536 Cognitive Behaviour Theories and Therapies

What you need to know

Elective Subjects

Any SSC unit that is not classified as a core unit within the Master of Counselling award is classified as an elective subject.

Before enrolling into an elective subject, ensure you have met the pre-requisite for that unit.

Pre-requisites

A pre-requisite is a unit that must be successfully completed before attempting another unit. For example, in order to attempt SSC514, you must complete SSC412. Students must have completed the pre-requisite to enrol in the subject.

Course Levels

400 or 500 level is indicated in the course code e.g., SSC410 is a 400-level Social Science unit, whereas RES500 is a 500-level Research unit. The units increase in difficulty and build upon content and concepts that have come before.

What should I enrol in?

Core Units

The following three units contain foundational content that the rest of the course builds on. They are also pre-requisites for most of the other units so it's important that you complete these in your first semester (first two semesters if studying part time).

- RES401 Postgraduate Research and Writing
- SSC410 Psychology of Emotion and Wellbeing
- SSC412 Counselling Practice I

The following are all core units, it's recommended that you take them during your first three semesters. **See page 4 for a suggested full time enrolment pattern.**

- SSC510 Human Lifespan Development
- SSC514 Counselling Practice II
- SSC516 Mental Health
- SSC517 Applied Counselling Theories
- SSC520 Professional Considerations
- THE401 Christian Worldview

Not all units are available every semester. Check the timetable for unit availability.

Electives and Capstone

You will also need to complete the following. It is recommended that these units are taken towards the end of your degree.

- Two SSC units (20 credit points) at 400 level or above.
- At least one counselling modality unit such as:
 - SSC531 Solution Focused Therapy and Positive Psychology or
 - SSC536 Cognitive Behaviour Theories and Therapies
- Capstone research unit:
 - RES500 Independent Guided Research

Placement

Your placement comprises of two units:

- SSC519 Professional Accountability
- SSC500 Professional Practice (100 hour Placement)

SSC519 is a weekly supervision class that runs alongside SSC500. These two units **must be taken at the same time.** They are typically completed in the final semester of your degree. See more information about placements here. Students must complete SSC520 Professional Considerations and a counselling modality unit before undertaking placement.

Cross Credits and RPL

If you have completed previous studies/work experience in the same or related areas, you may be eligible to receive credit towards one of the units in your program. There are two main types of credit:

A **cross credit** is awarded for similar study completed elsewhere or as part of a different degree. Cross credits can be granted as:

- A like for like credit for one of the units in the degree.
- An unspecified cross credit full credit for a certain amount of credit points, but not correlating specifically to any particular unit. Unspecified credits usually function as one of your electives.
- An exemption without credit i.e. you won't need to complete a particular unit, but will need to complete another elective in its place.

Recognition of prior learning (RPL) is credit granted in light of professional experience.

Requests for credit are made via the <u>Student Gateway</u>. You will need to provide adequate evidence of meeting learning outcomes for the requested units e.g., transcripts, unit outlines or a detailed resume.
